Welcome to the First Edition of The Bike Doctors

One of the questions we're asked is... "why do my brakes squeal". Brake squeal is a very common problem we deal with on a regular basis. But before the answer here's a little background on your brakes.

There are four major types of rim braking systems, cantilever, V-brakes, U-brakes and caliper. These systems all use cabling to actuate the brake shoes attached to the fork or the frame to pinch the rotating rim and stop the bicycle. All four of the systems use similar rubber materials attached to metal backings for their brake shoes. The first step in resolving brake squeal is setting proper "toe in." This means that the front of the pads are set to hit the rims about 1 mm before the back. If your brake pads are adjusted properly and they still squeal, chances are you have brake crud (a highly technical term) on the braking surface of the rim that must be cleaned. Isopropyl alcohol works great as well as 409 cleaner. If these products can't clean it, the rim may need to be resurfaced.

If you still have a squeal, the pivot arms holding the shoes may be loose or worn and will have to be adjusted or replaced. Wet rims, cold, or humid conditions, can also play a part in the big squeal. In most cases brake squeal is correctable with the right medicine and a little therapy.
